Information on UK FCDO e-Apostille


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
Dear Sir/Madam.

I work for the Legalisation department of the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office in the United Kingdom. We have identified that you may be a recipient of apostilles issued for UK public documents. You may already be aware that in 2022, we launched our online e-Apostille service which enabled citizens to obtain digital apostilles for their documents. The purpose of this email is to provide guidance on how to view and verify our e-Apostille, and hopefully encourage more users to take advantage of the service. Below are the steps necessary to view and verify a UK e-Apostille.


- The user downloads the PDF from within their Legalisation account on our website (<a href="https://www.gov.uk/get-document-legalised">https://www.gov.uk/get-document-legalised</a>)
- 2. The user/recipient opens the PDF using Adobe Acrobat Reader
- 3. This will then show the e-Apostille cover sheet as you can see below;




4. If you open the "Signature Panel", you will see that the document has been digitally signed by the Legalisation Office and that our signature is valid;



- 5. You can then either double-click on the paperclip icons or open the "Attachments" panel to view both the original public document that has been legalised, and the apostille file.
- 6. As it has been attached to a coversheet, the public document remains intact, complete with the original digital signature as it was issued by the public official as you can see below;



The apostille attachment will also confirm the details of the public official that has signed the document that is also attached;

This digital apostille differs from the paper-based version as there is no visible watermark on the document, it is digitally signed by the Legalisation Office as opposed to having a wet-ink signature, and there is some additional wording that confirms it must form part of a PDF file and is therefore not valid if printed.

Due to how this PDF is generated, any attempts to manipulate or modify the document would invalidate the digital signatures on the document and therefore would enable the recipient to confirm they had been tampered with. Additionally, the unique apostille reference number can be used to verify the details on the apostille on the <a href="verify an apostille">verify an apostille</a> website. The requirements for public officials when preparing documents for an e-Apostille are that they must use either an Advanced or a Qualified electronic signature. This is a specific standard of digital signature that, following elDAS regulation, instils confidence in the identity of the signatory.

Since launching in 2022 we have seen the number of recipient authorities increase as users become more familiar with e-Apostille. I hope the above details will prove helpful in enabling you to support this growing service, and I am more than happy to answer any questions you may have regarding e-Apostille, or indeed the wider Legalisation process. Please do feel free to share this with any colleagues or members who receive UK apostilles.
